Many residents have commented on the tidy Pinfold – made possible by a successful bid for support from the LCC Highway Service *Social Value Volunteering Days*. An early start on 23rd October saw volunteers from WSP, LCC & Balfour Beatty weeding, pruning and clearing the ground to reveal the full extent of the Pinfold, followed by laying of weed suppressant fabric and gravel ready for over-wintering.

Records suggest a Pinfold has been in Hemswell since the 1600s, and it's believed a 'time capsule' was buried there in 1977 - if anyone knows its exact whereabouts, please let us know!

Thanks to all involved, including Joanne & Mick Price for accommodating the skip, John Palmer for donating paving slabs, Janet Burton, Bryan Mander, Richard Brown of Aisby and the Village Hall Committee for allowing access to the hall facilities for our hard-working visitors.

Regarding grants, the PC has submitted a bid to WLDC for just under £2000.00 to commission a specialist tree survey and an ecology and biodiversity assessment of 'The Beck' and civil Cemetery – two areas identified as 'Local Green Spaces' in our neighbourhood plan. The assessments will identify the best ways to enhance and manage the areas, providing suitable access for walking and enjoyment and

SID is on the move

Take it slow...

Following requests from residents, the Speed indicator Device (SID) is now monitoring traffic along Dawnhill Lane. It's been watching Church Street and counted 6105 vehicles between 5th September and 28th October 2023. Results show a seven-day average daily movement of 112 vehicles, peaking at 11:00 - 12:00 am and again at 4:00- 5:00 pm, travelling at an average of 23.6 mph. Figures also reveal that 91% of monitored vehicles travelled at 30 mph or less in the 30 mph area. Thankfully, most vehicles adhere to the limit, but it doesn't mean that 30 mph is a 'safe' speed for the village, especially given its small roads, blind corners and concealed driveways. So, although the speed limit is 30 mph, there's evidence to suggest that in villages like Hemswell and on many rural roads...... twenty's plenty!

Setting the Precept

Balancing the budget



It's the time of year when the PC must agree its budget and *precept* for the next financial year. A precept is effectively a charge added by WLDC to your council tax bill to cover the cost of providing services within the community. The PC doesn't receive direct funding from central government, so it relies on the precept, plus any other sources of income, to meet its spending costs, including insurance, grass cutting, cemetery costs, maintaining 'SID' and street furniture, and staff costs. But the PC also wants to be able to fund donations and grants, undertake projects, support local

groups and cover contingencies, which is why it has sound financial management to spend money appropriately and carefully.

Over the last few years, the PC has used its 'reserve money' to avoid big increases in the precept despite its rising costs. Residents can be assured that councillors will thoroughly look at costs and budgets to ensure the PC continues to provide a good level of service but can still plan and fund future projects and activities that will enhance our parish and benefit our community.

Local Schools

The PC would like to thank Tina Ramsay for bringing to its attention comments referring to local school capacity at the September PC meeting (in the context of planning applications). Willoughton Primary School Business Manager has confirmed that each school can accommodate 10-11 children per year and that neither school is at capacity and welcomes local developments to support the Willoughton and Hemswell Cliff schools. The PC hopes that local schools will benefit from the planned increase of dwellings in Hemswell Cliff (an increase from 180 to 341) but will resist planning applications for sites not allocated in the neighbourhood plan or that do not have the community's support.

In remembrance

Anyone who has ever browsed the Hemswell & Harpswell' *Memory Books'* will know that the Tatam family feature across the whole collection, and councillors were sad to learn of the passing of Mr Mark Tatam. The PC is grateful for Mr Tatam's significant contributions to Hemswell and Harpswell over the years, and councillors send their condolences to the family.
